To all who may be concerned and able to help:

I, and many of my colleagues (signed below), would like to propose a project for Dr. D. A. Perley Elementary School. This project involves the "re-wilding" of a portion of the Perley property. All our students need a safe, on-site area in order to explore wild things in a school-based area. Our special needs and behavioural students need an on-site wild area to play and explore natural objects in a safe environment. There are many philosophical and educational links to research and examples to be found of Natural or Wild Playgrounds. Out-door, play-based learning, is a legislated part of our curriculum as is Aboriginal awareness.

I am aware that Perley school and PAC have designated the grass area between the playground and the bus loop as a playground extension area focusing on mobility access. Perfect- great area! There is also an important plan for the paved courtyard between rooms 5 and 8 and the Music portable. This area requires fencing so that an outside water fountain can be reinstated at Perley school and benches for reading, "literacy and numeracy on the pavement"- all wonderful, joyful plans.

I do not want to take the value and the drive from these projects but, I do want to put before you another important request- a "re-wilded" area.

My area of choice, for a re-wild area, would be the zone behind the basketball court. It already includes a wonderful climbing tree, 3 healthy mature trees, several young healthy trees, 2 picnic tables, and the Storage shed, where materials could be stored. "Re-wilding" this area would require several work orders for the school district level.

First, a fence with arch or plain openings, not gates. This will help designate an area for the students- entering the "Magic zone" or the "Wild zone" yet not be locked, allowing flow in and out. I do not have an exact size in mind- as big as possible! I realize that the baseball diamonds/soccer field can not be infringed on... Second, that the area is left to wild itself with our help- not mowed or shovelled or raked. These are the only requests I can see for the school board level...

After this first step- a committee can be formed with interested teachers, staff, students, parents, and local nature organizations like "Wild BC" and "The Invasive Species Council" and others to work together to come up with a plan to "rewild" the area.

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
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

SD51 District Inquiry 2018/19

Focus - What does our District Focus need to be?

Intellectual: To develop deeper thinking skills, while balancing the development of foundational skills in literacy & numeracy with the need to focus on metacognition through strength based assessment and experiential learning.

Human and Social: To develop student enjoyment of school, self-regulation and a growth mindset through connectedness to place and the environment.

Career Development: To improve student awareness of one's skills/competencies (strengths/stretches) by providing more hands-on learning and more opportunities to connect with school, community, post-secondary and the work place.

Take Action - What can we do as a District to make a meaningful difference on our *Focus*?

Intellectual:

- Carol Fullerton sessions will provide instructional strategies in Numeracy.
- Peter Liljedahl training for The Thinking Classroom strategies.
- More time needs to be dedicated to applying assessment practices that provide students with evidence of learning.
- Evidence based Literacy assessments & strategies in K-3.
- Staff require multiple opportunities to participate in professional learning to collaboratively strengthen classroom practices.

Human and Social:

- Through the work of Shelley Moore, teachers are learning to design lessons so that ALL students can access learning.
- Continue with supporting pedagogical shifts to playification, place-based & outdoor learning.

Career Development:

- Each school actively provides more hands-on learning opportunities for ALL students in ALL courses.
- Expanding the application of what is learned to real life.
- Special focus on ADST, computational thinking and Maker Ways opportunities tied into curricular competencies and core competencies.

Developing a Hunch - What will lead to these situations?

Intellectual: Will learning be deeper and more interesting if student ownership is embedded through reflective and engaging practices?

Social and emotional: Will welcoming schools that embrace inclusive practices enhance student learning and the well-being of ALL students?

Career - Will more experiential learning opportunities help students develop a deeper awareness of their strengths?

Learning - What do we need to learn?

Intellectual: Continue to engage students in reflective processes to help develop thinking skills. Develop comfort in giving students an opportunity to show what they know in multiple ways and to develop a growth mindset.

Human and Social: How to enhance lesson design that accommodates students strengths' and stretches. How to more regularly use place-based learning, selfregulation and student talk.

Career Development: How to more regularly provide learning opportunities focused on design theory and hands on learning opportunities. Agenda
